HIGHLIGHTS

Andhra Pradesh (AP) & Telangana (TS)

- Launched 'The KCP Limited' funded foot care unit and provided 153 customised protective footwear.
- Under the USAID EpiC project, the Resource Mobilisation & Comms. team led the strategy discussions & meetings on the resource mobilisation components of 18 CSOs.

Bihar

- Training to CFAR (Centre for Advocacy & Research) staff was given on Morbidity Management & Disability Prevention (MMDP).
- Received kind donation of 1.05 tonnes of rice.
- Four new districts to be added under our Rural Eye Health (REH) programme.

Madhya Pradesh (MP)

- Provided technical support to the government in the Active Case Finding (ACF) activity covering a population of 34,000.
- Initiated a satellite referral centre in Maharaja Yeshwantrao (MY) medical institute, Indore.

Odisha

- Successfully re-opened our care centre -Swabhiman in Subarnapur. It offers end-toend services for the leprosy affected.
- Training provided to government healthcare staff (medical officers, lab technicians, block nodal leprosy workers etc.)

MNC & JNC (Eyecare)

- Celebrated the 17th foundation day of MNC (Mahanadi Netra Chikitsalaya).
- 1,510 cataract surgeries were performed at our eye care hospitals MNC & JNC (Junagarh Netra Chikitsalaya).
- Around 1200 people were screened for cataract through 11 eye screening camps.

Research

- 40 leprosy affected were assessed for COVID19 Appropriate Behaviour (CAB) post COVID19 vaccination.
- Clinical services were availed by 452 persons.

Meet our staff...

Vaheed Basha is our Project Associate from 2019 in Andhra Pradesh. We had a conversation about his journey and the below information gives a glimpse about his experience with LEPRA.



You have been working in the field of leprosy for over 25 years, share your observation?

Vaheed Basha

One of the key things I observed is, in earlier days, people used to approach us when they start observing the skin patches on their body. Sadly, these days, people are approaching when the disabilities start to show up which makes it difficult for us to treat. Early detection and cure is the only way to fight leprosy.

Share any of your experiences with our beneficiaries.

During COVID19, people affected by Lymphatic Filariasis were finding it difficult to get vaccinated as they cannot stand for a long time due to swollen legs. It made them really happy when we facilitated the vaccinations. Also, it gives me immense pleasure to see the smile of our beneficiaries when we touch them with care in spite of having disabilities.

What makes LEPRA an unique organisation?

I am glad that along with leprosy as a key focus, we are also serving the people with Lymphatic Filariasis as there are very few organisations catering to their health needs. LEPRA is unique because we are working in 10 state, provide service to beneficiaries free of cost and have comprehensive interventions for affected by leprosy.

Prasant's reflections...

Celebrated the 73rd Republic Day, the World Leprosy Day 2022 & Neglected Tropical Diseases Day to remind ourselves that though we have come a long way we are still far from achieving a Leprosy free India. Stigma and discrimination exists and India still contributes more than 60% of the global new leprosy cases. In spite of the rampaging 3rd wave of COVID19 across the country, the team managed to reach out to the people affected by leprosy with services, emergency assistance and vaccinations. Managed to





interact and meet people affected by leprosy and LF in Nirmal (TS), Sonepur, Binka and Bargarh (Odisha). Attended the MNC advisory board meeting and the impressive 17th foundation day at Sonepur. Happy to have managed to restart the in-patient services at Swabhiman (earlier BOLEP) Care Center at Sonepur with five beds and quite a bit of support from the district administration and local residents. Joined the preparatory meeting for the International Leprosy Congress to be held in Hyderabad this year with Central Leprosy Division, ILEP, Indian Association of Leprologists (IAL) and other partners.
